Why was the Community Research Advisory Council formed?

- Leadership at Johns Hopkins University wanted to become more informed about the health and research priorities of patients and local residents
- The Johns Hopkins University Institute for Clinical and Translational Research wanted to create a forum for ongoing community input in the research process.
- Patients and local residents wanted to become more involved in the research process.
- From 2010-2018 there were chapters on the Johns Hopkins East Baltimore Medical Campus and Johns Hopkins Bayview. In 2019, these chapters merged to form the Combined C-RAC Board.

Mission

- Promoting equitable access to health care in research and address health disparities and social justice in study design
- Improving community awareness, trust, knowledge, understanding and participation to all phases of the research continuum
- Improving researchers' commitment to a fully engaged community within the entire research process

C-RAC Membership & Responsibilities

C-RAC Membership

- As of November 2023, C-RAC had 25 members, 61% not JH affiliated (Bylaws require at least 51% non-JH affiliates)
- Membership is open for all people working or living in Greater Baltimore- Washington region, interested in community engagement in Research.
- Individuals with various ages, professions, background, and expertise are encouraged to reflect the diversity in the Greater Baltimore- Washington region

Members' responsibilities


- Attend the 1 ½ hour monthly meetings by at least 75% each year of service

- Serve on at least one subcommittee by actively attending its meetings and activities










Strategies to strengthen community engagement



C-RAC: assistance to researchers during COVID

- In April 2020, C-RAC re-aligned its processes to support efforts of COVID-19 research teams
 - Promoted community capacity for remote engagement
 - Developed expedited review consultation for research teams
 - Acknowledged the elephant in the room: We acknowledged that the words "research" and "clinical trials" still evoke negative reactions from community stakeholders
- Expedited Review Consultation
 - —45-minute virtual meeting
 - —Consultants provide participant-centered review of study design in preparation for COVID-19 IRB submissions, including:
 - Recruitment
 - Communications
 - Implementation
 - Dissemination

The Community Research Advisory Council (C-RAC) is a group of community stakeholders and Johns Hopkins University faculty and staff that provides consultations for study teams on community engagement throughout the research life cycle, from planning to dissemination of findings. By working together with research teams and faculty, C-RAC informs research and educational programs and promotes community health and knowledge.



C-RAC and TL 1 Scholars partnership – born virtual

- In 2020, the CCC/C-RAC, and TL 1 program formed an innovative partnership that helped support the TL 1 Program's multi-institution partnership to train students pursuing careers in clinical and translational research.
- Provided the C-RAC with the opportunity to provide community input and support to trainees early in their research career <u>and</u> an opportunity to learn more about research design.
- From **September to November**, the C-RAC met with 15 TL 1 Scholars and provided input on study design, dissemination, and provided linkages to community groups




